Source of Water: LITTLE SWAN LAKE SDTo determine Little Swan Lake's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, a Well Site Survey, published in 1989 by the Illinois EPA, was reviewed. Based on the information contained in this document, no potential sources of groundwater contamination are present that could pose a hazard to groundwater pumped by the Little Swan Lake community water supply wells. The Illinois EPA has determined that Little Swan Lake wells #2 and #6 are not susceptible to IOC, VOC, and SOC contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including: monitoring conducted at the wells, monitoring conducted at the distribution system, and the available hydrogeologic data for the wells.
